



'The house had bags of potential but we had a sinking feeling when we moved in and we thought what have we done?'

The couple were experienced at renovating as they had done up three houses before, but it was undoubtedly their biggest challenge yet. 'Our lowest point was having no bathroom and having to bath in the butler's sink in the scullery,' says Catherine.

The full scale of the renovation gradually became apparent. 'As there were no soakaways, there was water damage in the drawing room. Death watch beetle rampaged under the floor and consequently a friend fell through the floorboards!' says Simon. 'Ben found

mummified rats in the attic and wanted to take them into school for show and tell!'

The house was gutted and a new heating system installed. They rewired, removed all the old lead pipes, put in a new kitchen and new bathrooms. The wooden beams were painted black and had to be sandblasted to lighten them. The dust went up the chimney and out the fireplaces into the bedrooms," says Simon. There was even grit in the beds."

They moved from one room to another as each one was renovated and then, after three years working on the house, started work on the cottage and barn.

Catherine was keen to create a classic country look for the interior. I love browsing around design shops and often take my inspiration from them. The key to our look is a mix of old and new – we also swap things with our shop, Quill Farm and Country Antiques to create a new look every now and then.

Now all the work is finished, the family can enjoy the house and surroundings. "We love it here," says Catherine. "We lead the lives we want to lead. We go walking at the coast and it's rural here — we love the slower pace of life."
